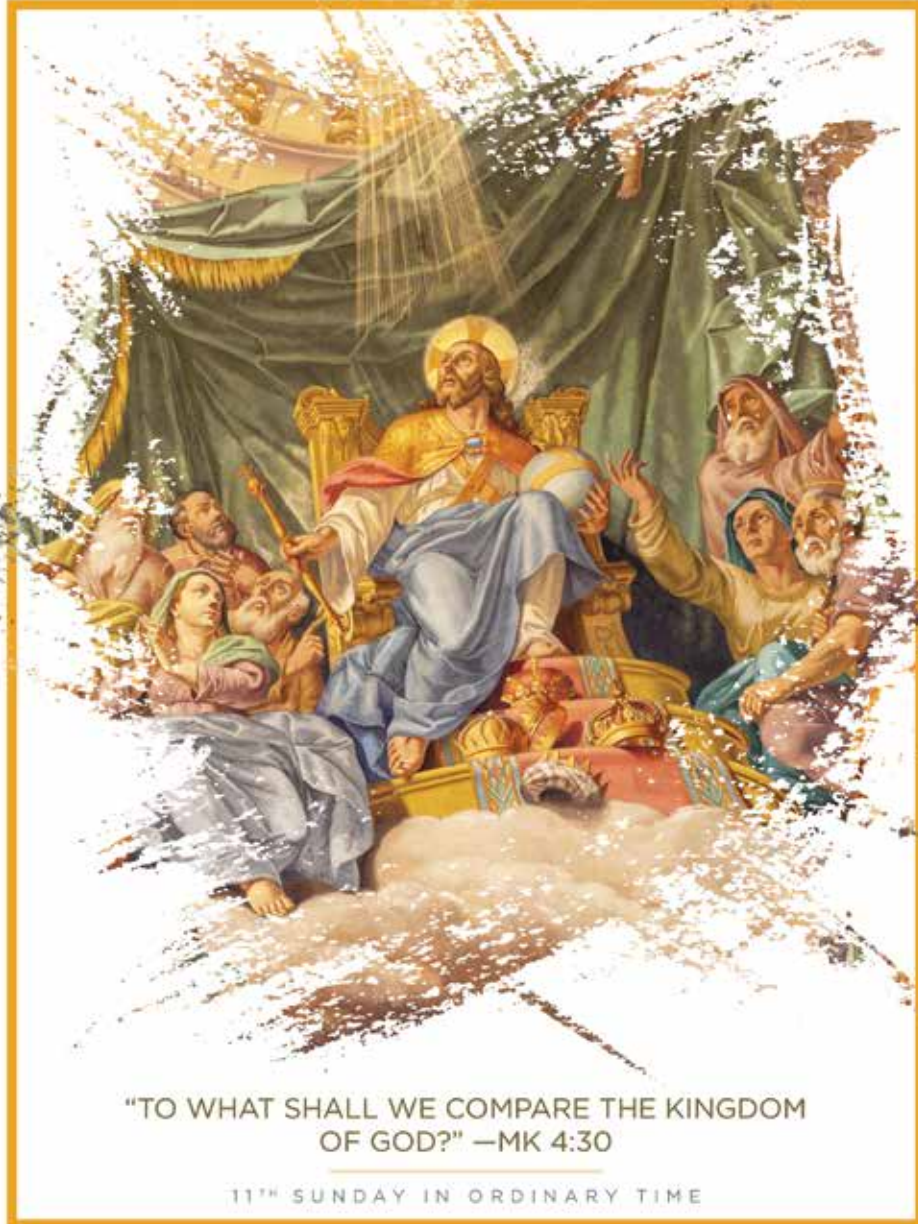

Reflect

AND RESPOND TO SCRIPTURE

FIRST READING:

The prophet Ezekiel's image of God growing Israel into a mighty majestic cedar tree bearing fruit, with birds nesting in its branches was intended to be words of comfort for the exiled Israelites in Babylon. **How do you find God's comfort in times of distress?**

SECOND READING:

Paul encourages the believers in Corinth to be courageous in knowing one day all will appear before "the judgment seat of Christ." **How confident are you in reflecting on judgment day?**

GOSPEL:

Mark tells us that Jesus often spoke in parables to the crowds about the kingdom of God. Today's parables speak to the often unseen and subtle growth of the kingdom of God in our midst. **How might you better observe the kingdom of God at work in your life?** ©LPi

LIVE THE LITURGY INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Jesus compares the Kingdom of God to a mustard seed, the tiniest of seeds. When planted, the tiny mustard seed grows into a tremendous tree with large branches. So too in each of our lives small things can have profound effects. God can use one of our more insignificant gestures to radically change another person's life. It may be the kindness of a smile, our willingness to accommodate someone, listening to someone's story, helping someone who is hurting, standing up for someone who is right or complimenting someone on something they did. We all have God given gifts and talents. What are some of yours? Our task is to use our talents creatively, consistently, lovingly, and generously. Because we are always guided by the Holy Spirit, things that may be insignificant or unnoticed to us can profoundly change the life of someone else. While we may think we are small and insignificant, God can make us large and magnificent. All we have to do is open ourselves to being used. We trust that God will take care of the rest.



HEARTS ON FIRE at Sacred Heart Where Faith is Known, Lived, & Shared

I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing. (Luke 12:49)

On November 22, 2020, Archbishop Vigneron wrote a Pastoral Note on *Families of Parishes: Led by the Spirit on Mission*.

LISTEN: Unleash the Gospel, Marker 4.3: Charisms: Christ's disciples were never meant to carry out her divine mandate to evangelize on the basis of human resources alone. Christ has endowed his bride with an abundance of supernatural *charisms*, gifts of the Holy Spirit that equip *every* member of the body of Christ to do his or her part in bearing witness to Christ and building up the Church. And **Unleash the Gospel, Guidepost 5—No Bystanders:** Christ calls *every* priest, deacon, religious and lay person to embark upon the new evangelization, to employ new methods and a new fervor in unleashing the Gospel. "The new evangelization calls for personal involvement on the part of each of the baptized. *Every* Christian is challenged, here and now, to be *actively engaged* in evangelization"—Pope Francis. (Emphasis added)

PRAY: Tear or cut off this prayer and keep it where you'll remember to pray it throughout the week

Come, Holy Spirit, Lord of the Gifts, to Sacred Heart Church and to our Sister Parishes; Engage our hearts and minds to recognize and then to give assent and cooperate with your Grace to find and use those gifts you have given to each and every one of us. Show us how to discern the particular gifts, our charisms, that you have given to each of us to build your Church. We ask that you meet each of us where we are and then draw us to where you want us to be. Lift us out from the place of "bystander" and into the "new fervor" where we will unleash the Gospel. Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in us the fire of your love as we unleash the Gospel around us. Amen!

ASK & ACT: What is this Note saying to *me*? Do I believe that the Holy Spirit has gifted *me* with a special gift that I am to use for building His Church? Am I willing to begin to discern what that might be? What might be keeping me from starting down this path of discernment? I will pray for the Holy Spirit to remove those obstacles and open the way.

Saint OF THE WEEK

JUNE 17 | SAINT ALBERT CHMIELOWSKI

On June 17, it is the feast day of St. Albert Chmielowski. As a young revolutionary and artist in Poland, Adam Chmielowski was not a young man whom people thought would someday be a saint. He was born in 1845 to wealthy parents and studied agriculture with plans of taking over his family's estate near Krakow. In 1863 he took part in an uprising against Czar Alexander III and the Russian army and lost a leg in the fighting when he was just 17. Because of his actions against Russia, he had to leave Poland. Young Adam went to Belgium, where he discovered he had some artistic ability. He also studied painting in Paris and Germany.



Chmielowski returned to Poland when he was nearly 30 and soon became concerned with the suffering of the many homeless and impoverished Poles. He worked in homeless shelters and eventually realized that it was this work, rather than politics or art, that called to him.

In 1887 he joined religious life as Brother Albert of the Third Order of St. Francis. He lived in the homeless shelters with those he served. Within

a year, Brother Albert had founded his own branch of the Franciscans, the Servants of the Poor, who are sometimes called the Albertine Brothers. A few years later he helped found a women's congregation with the same intent of helping Poland's poor. Brother Albert believed that the biggest problem of the world was that people did not open their eyes to the suffering of others and offer help. He believed that the divisions in society among the rich and the poor enabled that "blindness." He died on December 25, 1916, in a shelter he had opened in Krakow. Blessed Pope John Paul II canonized him a saint of the church in 1989. He is the patron saint of painters, servants of the poor, and soldiers.

PROTECT THE HYDE AMENDMENT

Prevent Taxpayer Dollars from Supporting Elective Abortions

BACKGROUND: Beginning in 1976, members of Congress and the White House have consistently supported the Hyde Amendment, a federal policy which has prevented taxpayer dollars from paying for elective abortions. This language has been approved every year since then, regardless of which political party has been in control of Congress or the presidency. In addition to wide legislative support, the general public is highly favorable of the Hyde Amendment and similar provisions. Many public opinion surveys demonstrate that a strong majority of individuals in the country—including those of different income levels, races, and positions regarding abortion—oppose using tax dollars to pay for abortion.¹

Despite public opinion, pro-abortion groups and certain elected officials are campaigning to rescind the Hyde Amendment and to instead implement a policy that would require every federal health program to cover, and every federal health facility to provide, elective abortions. If adopted, the new policy would go as far as to nullify state and local policies against abortion coverage, rescinding the compromise policy agreed to by President Obama and Congressional Democrats in the Affordable Care Act of 2010.²

The stakes are high, as the Hyde Amendment saves the lives of mothers and children and respects the consciences of the American people. It is estimated that over 2.4 million children are alive now due to the Hyde Amendment.³ If Hyde and similar measures are not approved in this year's appropriations process, billions of taxpayer dollars could start being used for elective abortions in this country.

THE TIME FOR ACTION IS NOW. Congress is considering the annual budget legislation which have consistently included the Hyde Amendment and similar amendments. It is imperative that federal lawmakers hear from **YOU to stop tax dollars from paying for abortion.**

ACTION NEEDED:

Visit www.NoTaxpayerAbortion.com in early June and tell Congress to retain the Hyde Amendment and similar provisions in this year's budget bills. Then urge a friend to do the same.

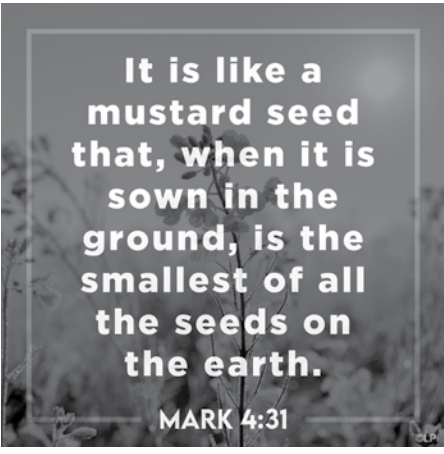
