

LISTEN to the Church teaching about Charisms given to individual believers: Continued from last week: **6)** The gifts "demand" that those who have received them "exercise them" for the growth of the whole Church. We are to be "good stewards" of the graces given us. **7)** Charisms enable each member of the faithful to offer a "totally unique contribution." There is something you and I have been given to do and to give that no one else in the entire Church can do or give. **8)** Each one, therefore, must be helped to embrace the gift entrusted to him as a completely unique person, and to hear the words which the Spirit of God personally addresses to him." The Christian community is called to help all Catholics embrace those gifts and use them for the good of all. **9)** The discernment of charisms is always necessary. No charism is exempt from being referred and submitted to the Church's shepherds. (*Fruitful Discipleship, by Sherry Weddell, pg 88-89*)

And ask God to turn your obstacles into highways.

Saint OF THE WEEK

JUNE 28 | SAINT IRENAEUS

On June 28, it is the feast day of St. Irenaeus. Saint Irenaeus was born in the year 120; he was of the Greek tongue, and probably a native of Asia Minor. His parents, who were Christians, placed him while still young under the care of the great Saint Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna. It was in this holy school that he learned the sacred science which later made him a great ornament of the Church and the terror of her enemies. Saint Polycarp cultivated his rising genius and formed his mind to piety by his precepts and example, and the zealous young scholar was careful to reap all advantages offered him by the solicitude of such a master. He listened to his instructions with an insatiable ardor, and so deeply did he engrave them in his heart that the impressions remained vivid even in his old age. To confound the heresies of his age, this Doctor of the Church acquainted himself with the conceits of the pagan philosophers, and thereby became qualified to trace every error to its sources and set it in its full light.

After Irenaeus had spent several years in combat against the eastern gnostics and philosophers of error, Saint Polycarp determined to send him to Gaul, where many of the heretics of Asia Minor had already migrated to pursue the Catholic religion, which was beginning to find roots there. With a company of about forty Christians, the valiant soldier of Christ ascended the Rhone to Lyons to rejoin and aid Saint Pothinus, its bishop. Saint Pothinus received the apostles with joy and soon ordained Saint Irenaeus.

A hundred times he exposed himself to martyrdom by his zeal, acting as the right arm of the aging bishop, but God was reserving that crown for him twenty-five years later. When Saint Pothinus had glorified God by his splendid martyr's death in the year 177, Irenaeus was chosen to be the second bishop of Lyons. The persecutors imagined that Christianity had been stifled in Lyons, and they ceased their pursuits for a time.

This great Doctor of the Church wrote many important works. By his preaching, Saint Irenaeus in a short time converted almost the whole country to the Faith; the Christians of Lyons became models by their candor, their estrangement from all ambition, their poverty, chastity, and temperance, and in this way confounded many adversaries of their religion. Finally, he suffered martyrdom there, with many others, in the year 202, under the Emperor Septimius Severus, after eighty years spent in the service of the Lord. He is the patron saint of the Archdiocese of Mobile, Alabama.

We ask all this through Christ our Lord and brother, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

The author of *The Cloud of Unknowing* prays, "That which I am and the way that I am, with all my gifts of nature and grace, you have given to me, O Lord, and you are all this. I offer it all to you, principally to praise you and to help my fellow Christians and myself." Knowing that God sustains us in being is the key to faith. All that we need to do is to love God as God is and the rest will begin to fall into place. God made us in His image and desires that we have life. God also desires that we be healed of all of our wounds, especially those caused by sin, and know his loving touch. Being weighed down by negativity, imperfections, the cares of the world, and weakness is not something that God desires.

Faith can profoundly change how we see God, ourselves, and one another. It gives a clearer lens through which to see life and connects us with the powerful virtues of love and hope. Three friends journeying with us through all that we encounter, faith, hope, and love, help us experience God's embrace and heal us. All we have to do is let God be who God is and not foolishly try to make Him into what we need or want Him to be. Without God we cease to be. It's that simple. The very blood that flows

through my veins and the life that I have come directly from Divine origins. With this knowledge of who God is and who I am, I can open my ears and hear the powerful words Jesus speaks, "Do not be afraid, just have faith." Trust begins.

When we are struggling, we naturally reach out for God because we know that a divine remedy is the only remedy. But, in doing so we wrestle with letting God take charge. We want something more miraculous and visible than the obvious and have difficulty in finding consolation simply resting in God's presence. Our naked being, stripped of any pretense or self-serving agenda, is being called to rest in and love the uncreated Presence of God. Reach out in love to God. Ask God to heal you from all that separates you from Him. Put aside any ideas of God that create barriers between you and God's tender and endearing presence. *The Cloud of Unknowing* leaves us with wisdom, "think of yourself and of him in the same way, that is, with the simple awareness that he is as he is and that you are as you are." This is a meeting of two friends who desire nothing more than to share life together. ©LPI



LEARNING MORE ABOUT FAMILY OF PARISHES

How will Families of Parishes affect poorer parishes? Will those less affluent parishes be forced or encouraged to close?

There is no pre-existing plan to force, encourage, or guide parishes with fewer resources to close.

As each Family discerns how to best align resources, they may decide to retain their separate identities and worship spaces. Others, after a careful and honest review of existing resources, may opt to close worship spaces or merge with partnering parishes. These decisions will be left to the discernment of that Family, with assistance from the Archdiocese of Detroit, guided by a complete focus on mission and the best interest of the entire community.

Is a Family of Parishes able to "reorganize" if, after a few years, it becomes apparent that its current configuration isn't in the best interest of all the parish communities in the Family?

Yes, if such reorganization makes sense and follows the law of the Church. However, the hope is that once a Family is established, they will begin the process of mission-centered planning, so reorganizing would be a last resort if all other measures fail.




The character of St. Peter is both inspiring

We are cautioned to be especially careful during the Coronavirus outbreak. Here are some simple ways to keep sickness away.




WASH YOUR HANDS
