A EUCHARISTIC LIFE: What does a Eucharistic life look like? One man describes a profound experience in his own life when he battled COVID. He was struggling for his life. He encountered his lowliness and vulnerability in a whole new way during his illness. However, something incredible happened while he was so ill. In the silence of his heart, God drew his attention to Him in his Eucharistic body. Through these moving experiences—feeling close to God in prayer and through those who loved and walked with him during that time—he experienced, in a deeply intimate way, the ONEness of his life and how it is united with both the ONE who is greater than all of us and with YOU, all the faithful.

*Apostolic Exhortation on the "Sacrament of Charity", the Holy Eucharist,
by Pope Benedict XVI*

LISTEN to POPE BENEDICT XVI: The Bishop: While it is true that the whole People of God participates in the eucharistic liturgy, a correct *ars celebrandi* [art of proper celebration] necessarily entails a specific responsibility on the part of those who have received the sacrament of Holy Orders. Bishops, priests and deacons, each according to his proper rank, must consider the celebration of the liturgy as their principal duty. Above all, this is true of the Diocesan Bishop: as "the chief steward of the mysteries of God in the particular Church entrusted to his care, he is the moderator, promoter, and guardian of the whole of its liturgical life."

PRAY: Throughout the week... LORD, give to our ordained Bishops an appreciation of the grave and specific responsibility they hold praying the celebration of the liturgy, and that it is their "principal duty." They are the "chief stewards of the mysteries of God." May they each understand and treasure that he is the "moderator, promoter, and guardian of the whole liturgical life." Amen!

ASK & ACT: What are these words saying to **me**? How often have I considered the importance and the responsibility of our Diocesan Bishop (Archbishop Weisenburger)? Do I recognize him as the "chief steward of the mysteries of God," and "the moderator, promoter, and guardian of the whole liturgical life" in Detroit? What a tremendous responsibility! He needs my prayers and the prayers of all of us. LORD, give him wisdom and strength. Hear our prayer.

The Exultation of the Cross

Crucifixion was a cruel instrument at of death Romans used to instill fear in people across their empire. Today, we celebrate the Cross on which Jesus died. We begin every Mass and our prayers uniting ourselves with Christ's bodily sacrifice by making *The Sign of the Cross* on our bodies.

Today's second reading begins: "*Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped*" (Phil 2:6-11). "*Grasped*" in the sense of "clung to." Jesus condescended to become man for one purpose, to embrace the Cross, cling to it, and consecrate it by freely choosing to be sacrificed for our salvation. "*He humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross*" because, as today's Gospel says, "*God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life*" (John 3:16).

The Cross is the universal symbol of Christianity. Catholic and Orthodox churches display a Crucifix, a cross with the Corpus of Christ sacrificed upon it rather than an empty cross which can represent Christ's victory over death. While the Resurrection is the culmination of the saving Sacrifice that began with the Last Supper and reached its climax on Calvary, we adorn our homes and celebrate Mass on altars beneath a Crucifix because we continue to participate in that one Sacrifice. At the end of the Eucharistic prayer, the priest elevates Jesus' Body and Blood, "*just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert*" (John 3:14), and invites us to "behold the Lamb of God." Viewing both the Crucifix and the Sacrament, we see the Victim and the Victor. It is fitting we pray "Lord I am not worthy" to receive so great a gift of healing and eternal life.

Our participation in Christ's sacrifice is an invitation to join with him spiritually on the Cross. There is no experience of pain, loss or humiliation that Jesus does not know intimately. We believe uniting our sufferings with Christ Crucified is an Exultation of the Cross that can be redemptive, remitting punishment for sins, and contributing to a spiritual good. Just as Christ's died on the Cross for a purpose, our suffering can have purpose, too, when offered as a loving sacrifice. "Offer it up!" and give suffering meaning.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

THE EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS *John 3:13-17*

One of my favorite movies is the 1991 comedy *What About Bob?* Bill Murray plays a troubled, paranoid hypochondriac named Bob Wiley who innocently but annoyingly hounds Dr. Leo Marvin, played by Richard Dreyfuss. Bob is paralyzed by his fear of, well, everything, and is convinced the psychologist can heal him. But Dr. Marvin's failed attempts to heal Bob end up driving the doctor to attempt to murder Bob. He fails. The surprise is that, having faced death head on, Bob is suddenly healed. He attributes his healing to Dr. Marvin for break-through "death therapy." In facing the cause of his deepest illness and dysfunction, Bob is healed.

Underneath this light-hearted comedy is a dead-serious resonance with this week's feast: the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. Christ is lifted up on the cross to force us to face the truth of sin and death. In that reckoning we find healing. Like Moses' snake on a pole, the cross says: this is what is causing your sickness – rebellion, disobedience, sin. Look at it! Don't run from it. Now seeing it exposed, we see life. We see our physician mercifully healing us. In this sense, we are all like Bob Wiley. The "death therapy" of the cross is our only hope for healing.

This week I invite you to "exalt the cross." If you don't have one in your house, get one. Use it for prayer. Gaze on it frequently. It teaches us to not be afraid. It heals us.

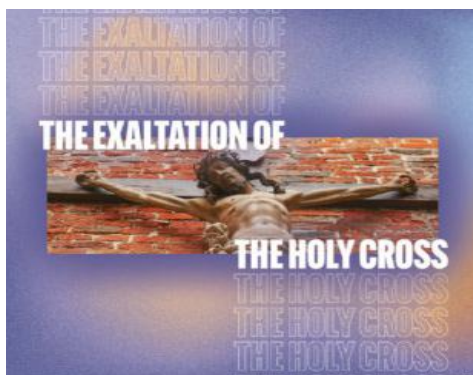

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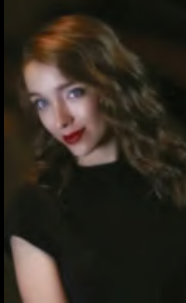
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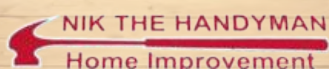
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
