NATIONAL Eucharistic Revival

A EUCHARISTIC LIFE: This Year of Mission invites us to live out this ONEness (both with God and with each other) with renewed vigor. Apostolic Exhortation on the "Sacrament of Charity", the Holy Eucharist, by Pope Benedict XVI

LISTEN to POPE BENEDICT XVI: The Bishop: He is the moderator, promoter, and guardian of the whole of its liturgical life. This is essential for the life of the particular Church, not only because communion with the Bishop is required for the lawfulness of every celebration within his territory, but also because he himself is the celebrant par excellence within his Diocese. It is his responsibility to ensure unity and harmony in the celebrations taking place in his territory.

PRAY: Throughout the week... LORD, give to our ordained Bishops an appreciation of their importance as "moderator, promoter, and guardian of the whole liturgical life" in his particular Church. No Bystanders

This column is inspired by Archbishop Vigneron's influential Pastoral Letter *Unleash the Gospel* (www.unleashthegospel.org/the-letter/). The Letter and Synod16 were grounded in a year of prayer for a new Pentecost, an outpouring of the Holy Spirit in Detroit "so that **every** member of the Church may be formed and sent forth as a joyful missionary disciple, so that the Gospel may be unleashed in southeast Michigan. Just as ... the Holy Spirit transformed Christ's [first] disciples from ordinary people into Spirit-filled evangelizers."

"Evangelizer" is a role that may seem foreign to Catholics. "Evangelical" may call to mind "bible-thumping" preachers or even political groups. Being a "missionary" may imply going off to strange lands. But *Unleash the Gospel* reminds us that being a missionary disciple is fundamental to our faith. Everyone has a role in Christ's Great Commission: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations" (Matt 28:19). Guidepost 5 states simply there are **"No Bystanders."** Evangelization is what we are called to do at the end of every Mass when the deacon sends us forth to "proclaim the Gospel by the way you live your lives."

In fact we are sent as missionaries into a very strange land, a culture that misdirects people away from God, denies objective truth, and even praises sinful behavior. It can be hard to speak the truth when people do not want to hear. Discipleship can be public such as praying quietly before an abortion clinic, but need not be loud and confrontational. A bold witness can be as simple as saying grace before a meal in public or letting a co-worker know you enjoyed Mass when they ask about your weekend.

Many patron saints of evangelization like Paul and Francis Xavier went boldly to the world. But Therese of Lisieux, who never left her cloister, is too. She evangelized by constant prayer that everyone may **Encounter** Jesus Christ, **Grow** in faithful relationship with Him, and give **Witness** to the Gospel. Our identity as baptized sons or daughters of God means relying on the Holy Spirit, graces we receive in the Sacrament, and prayer, to act joyfully in ways that draw others to Jesus by our example. That is being evangelical, a witness to the Gospel, and a missionary disciple.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

I am embarrassed to admit that I frequently find myself dining and socializing with people who have millions and sometimes billions of dollars. I've eaten more caviar, lobster and wagyu steak than most people on the planet. I justify it by saying it's part of my job. But I have seven pairs of nice jeans and expensive shoes.

So it is rather uncomfortable to hear Our Lord say: "My child, remember that you received what was good in your lifetime, while Lazarus likewise received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented" (Luke 16:25). Fellow rich people (and if you're American, you're rich), do we not vehemently though quietly object to this parable's karma-esque reward system? Why bless the rich man just to curse him later? And curse Lazarus just to bless him later? So Americans go to hell, while Burundians and Afghans go to heaven? What is going on?



One clue is that the condemned rich man doesn't complain of injustice. Rather, he simply begs to help his brothers to repent. Of what? We don't know exactly. Perhaps another clue is that the rich man now seems more like the downtrodden Lazarus. He knows what it is to be hungry and thirsty, to be wounded in the gutter; that he deserved that, not fancy meals and clothes. Maybe the rich man finally understands how to receive true blessings, but it is too late for him. But not for me. Not for us.

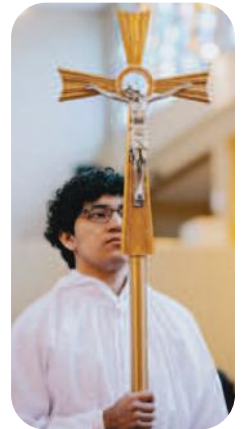
Altar Servers NEEDED

Morning Offering

There are many variations of the Morning Offering, but all share the same purpose: to begin each day by offering oneself to God, along with all the experiences, struggles and blessings that the day will bring.

The ancient Israelites practiced the bikkurim ("first fruits") as described in Deuteronomy, chapter 26. This was a ritual by which the first fruits of the harvest were offered back to God in a sacrificial act of gratitude and obedience. The theology behind the Morning Offering is similar: giving to God the first moments of each day.

The most traditional form of the Morning Offering, attributed to Fr. François-Xavier Gautrelet, begins "O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I offer you my prayers, works, joys, and sufferings of this day, for all the intentions of your Sacred Heart..." 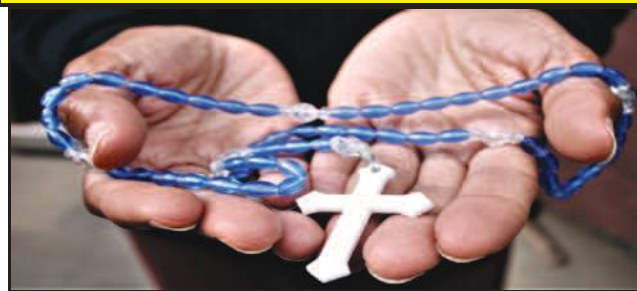

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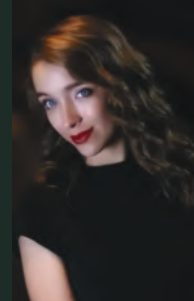
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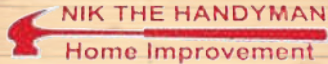


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
